INTRODUCTION:

The following text in nine Parts formed the basis for the March 2024 premiere performance of KNOWING / NOT KNOWING at the Park & Market facility in downtown San Diego. Several orienting observations:

- The italicized red text at the beginning of each Part constitutes a brief characterization of the meaning/function of this portion of the text. It is not presented in performances.
- In later stages, this libretto will feature two vocal soloists in addition to the a cappella choir: a soprano (SOP) and a tenor (TEN). Additionally, there is a narrator role (NAR).
- For the March 2024, Stage 1, performances, these roles were managed by recorded and video-taped actors directed by Robert Castro.
- Finally, it must be noted that the words of the text are not mine, but have been assembled by me from over two-dozen different sources that span millennia and cultures.



I. INFANCY / INDIVIDUATION

To begin, establish an "innocent", a touching foundation: the fragility and tenderness of life itself. How does as individuality arise as a new being interacts with their world?
